

<u>THE BRILLIANT CLUB GRADUATION TRIP TO OXFORD – YEAR 8 & 9s</u>

The Brilliant Club is a UK-based educational charity dedicated to increasing access to highly selective universities for pupils from underrepresented backgrounds. Through its flagship Scholars Programme, the charity places doctoral and postdoctoral researchers-known as PhD tutors-into schools to deliver university-style tutorials and enrichment opportunities. These sessions aim to equip students with the skills, knowledge, and confidence to succeed in higher education.

As part of this programme, our Year 8 and 9 Brilliant Club student's took part in a truly inspiring and memorable graduation visit to Keble College, Oxford, in May. The day was packed with enriching experiences, beginning with a guided tour of the college grounds led by welcoming and knowledgeable student ambassadors. Pupil's explored the historic architecture, learned about daily student life, and gained a deeper understanding of the academic environment at Oxford.

In addition to the tour, students attended informative sessions that explored the rich history of the University of Oxford and the wide range of academic and extracurricular opportunities it offers. These sessions helped pupil's to imagine their own futures in higher education and inspired them to aim high in their academic journeys.

A standout moment of the day was the graduation ceremony, which featured a powerful keynote speech by Bogdan Bosoi, a Year 8 student. Speaking with confidence and passion, Bogdan reflected on his experience as a Brilliant Club scholar and the profound impact the programme has had on his development. He spoke about the key skills he had gained analytical thinking, resilience, and teamwork and how he intends to apply them as he pursues his ambition to study Computer Science at university.

YEAR 9 CAREERS INTERVIEWS

To support Year 9 students in making informed decisions about their GCSE options and to help them start thinking about potential career paths, each student took part in a one-to-one session with an independent careers advisor. GUARDIAN NEWSPAPER EXPERIENCE

On Tuesday 30 April, a group of pupils from NBS, including members of the School Journalism Club, had the exciting opportunity to visit The Guardian's Head Office in Central London.

During the visit, pupils were given a behind-the-scenes look at one of the UK's leading national newspapers. They heard directly from senior editors, journalists, and members of the press team, who shared valuable insights into how the newspaper operates on a day-to-day basis-from news gathering and fact-checking, to editorial decisions and the publishing process.

Pupils learned about the editorial values that shape The Guardian's journalism, including the importance of accuracy, balance, and ethical reporting. They also explored the different career roles within a major news organisation, ranging from investigative journalism to digital content production, design, and media law.

Members of the Journalism Club had the chance to ask questions and engage in discussions about press freedom, the role of the media in a democracy, and how journalism is evolving in the digital age.

The visit was an inspiring experience for all involved, sparking greater interest in media literacy, storytelling, and future careers in journalism and communications. Pupils returned with a deeper understanding of the power of the press and the responsibility that comes with telling the stories that shape our world.

The lead mentors from the Girls' Network remarked on how impressed they were with the girl's ambition and dedication to the programme.

One pupil said of the programme: "Before I started [the girls network programme] I wasn't sure what I wanted to do in the future. From working with the mentors, I know that I want to work as a physio, I know I want to do Science A levels and go to uni. I think I will be good at this because, one of the things the programme taught me is that I am a good communicator."

Another pupil said: "The mentors have been really inspiring for me, I want to become a lawyer and I know how well I need to do in my GCSE's, the programme has given the motivation to really work hard for my GCSEs."



SUBJECT SPOTLIGHT: HISTORY


Year 7 pupils have recently been exploring the fascinating reign of Mansa Musa, the ruler of the Mali Empire in the 14th century. Through creative projects and activities, students have been showcasing how Mansa Musa's story reflects the wealth, culture, and influence of medieval West Africa. From his legendary pilgrimage to Mecca to the flourishing trade and learning in Timbuktu, pupils have been diving deep into this rich historical period, bringing its significance to life in imaginative ways.

Year 8 pupils have recently been studying the expansion of the British Empire, focusing on how colonialism unfolded in three distinct regions: Australia, South Asia, and Ireland. Through comparisons, students have been exploring the varied impacts of British rule, examining differences in governance, cultural influence, and resistance in each territory. This study has helped pupils understand the complexities and lasting legacies of imperialism across the globe.

Year 9 pupils have recently concluded their study of 20th-century Germany, gaining insight into what life was like for various groups under Nazi rule. This included an in-depth exploration of the Holocaust, focusing on the systematic persecution of minority groups-most notably the Jewish community-from 1933 onwards. Pupils were introduced to the Holocaust through the powerful story of Frank Bright, a Holocaust survivor who shared his experiences of survival and resilience during one of history's darkest periods. Through this study, pupils have developed a deeper understanding of the impact of Nazi policies on everyday lives and the tragic consequences of intolerance and discrimination.








SUBJECT SPOTLIGHT: MATHS

This Term's Topics: Real life

This term, our young mathematicians have been busy exploring how maths connects to the world around us. They've tackled exciting topics like distance, speed and time-perfect for understanding how fast things move and how long journeys take! We've also dived into mass, density, and volume, linking these ideas to real-life situations like why objects float or sink. From calculating force and pressure to working out the area of triangles, students discovered how these concepts are used in everything from building structures to understanding everyday materials. It's been a hands-on, practical term full of discovery and real -world connections!

SUBJECT SPOTLIGHT: RS

The start of summer term in Religious Studies has been packed full of really fantastic learning moments, with many pupils having developed a keen passion for the subject.

Year 7s have been chronologically working their way through the Abrahamic religions, and lots of the students have been delighted to reach Islam; it has been brilliant to see the pupils engaged in the history of how the religions have established, discovering the context behind familiar practises, and developing their curiosity for formation and evolution of social ideologies.

Year 8s have been thinking like theologians and philosophers this half term – applying classical philosophical debates to big life questions. It was great to see so many pupils engage with the topic outside of class, asking to learn about further classical arguments and thinkers in their free time.

Lastly, a huge well done to the **year 10s** who completed their RS GCSE! Every single student worked incredibly hard, demonstrating resilience, determination and passion. I am extremely proud of them.

SUBJECT SPOTLIGHT: ENGLISH

Year 7 English has been learning about how to write a paragraph response to an essay question about 'A Midsummer Night's Dream'. Students have been focused on understanding and exploring the themes of the writing and the contextual factors surrounding the writing of Shakespeare's comedy. Students are enjoying learning the confusing plot and trying to recall all of the characters and who they love.

Year 8 English has been revising how to write an essay response using an extract from Shakespeare's 'The Tempest'. Whilst learning this text, students are challenged by the writing of Shakespeare and interpreting meanings from the various themes of this tragicomedy. Students are particularly enjoying their exploration of drama through the text and how to read dramatically in order to bring the text to life.

Year 9 English has been learning their GCSE English Literature text of 'Macbeth' this half term whilst focusing on identifying key moments and themes in order to write clearly about the text. Students are striving to write clear and concise essays that establish their knowledge of the text and the contextual factors surrounding the Jacobean era in relation to 'Macbeth'.



UPCOMING EVENTS

Year 8 Basic Life Support Training

On Tuesday 10 June, Year 8 pupils will take part in a basic life support training course. The session will introduce essential lifesaving skills, including basic CPR theory, and how to respond in safely and promptly in emergency situations. This practical training aims to build pupils' confidence and awareness, equipping them with the knowledge to act effectively in critical moments.

Summer Term Careers Events

This week, Year 9 and 10 pupils attended a careers talk focused on post-16 options, with a particular emphasis on T Levels and apprenticeships. The session provided an overview of these vocational pathways, highlighting how they combine classroom learning with hands-on experience in the workplace. Pupils gained a clearer understanding of the structure, benefits, and career opportunities offered by T Levels and apprenticeships, helping them make more informed decisions about their future education and career paths.

This half term, pupils in all year groups will also have the valuable opportunity to attend a series of careers talks delivered by a diverse group of professionals. These will include a professor of mathematics, who will share insights into academic and research pathways (Friday 20 June); a representative from Dynamic Training, offering guidance on health and care apprenticeships (Wednesday 18 June); a psychologist working in academia, who will discuss research and teaching careers in psychology (Friday 27 June); and a civil servant, who will explore roles in public service and policy (Friday 27 June). The sessions will provide pupils with a broader understanding of potential career routes and the skills required in each field.

Mental Wellbeing

As we approach the end of the academic year and the pupils prepare for assessments, please remember pupils may struggle with their mental wellbeing due to:

- Putting pressure on themselves to do well
- Feeling pressure from parents and family members
- Struggling to balance revision and other parts of life like friends and hobbies
- Losing sleep over revision, exams and the idea of failing
- Feeling conflicted between knowing breaks can help with revision and stress, but feeling guilty for taking breaks
- Comparison to friends in how well they're doing in class/mock exams and how much revision they're doing
- Not having motivation to revise because it is hard and being convinced that they will fail regardless
- Feeling hopeless about the future if they don't do well in exams.
